

Key tips for writing a speech

Outline what you think **Australia's new parliament** should accomplish.

Aim for 200 words. This will translate to about **90 seconds**, which is the allocated time.

Highlight **one issue**, if you can, and talk about why it's important and what you want the future to be.

Don't focus on the politics of the issue, focus on **the change you would like to see**.

Explain why the issue is important and **why people should** care.

Use **simple language** which most people would be able to understand.

Shorter sentences are best. If you can break a sentence into two, consider doing so.

Introduction

This section should include: your name, age and electorate

Explanation

In this section: Think about the change you want to see, where would you like to see yourself and Australia in the future.

Is this change for you, your friends or family, the environment, technology, or social issues?

Why is this goal or issue important? Think about yourself and the people listening to your speech.

How do you think our new parliament can help achieve this change?

Conclusion

This section include: A short summary of your points, an ending on a positive note or a warning and a 'call to action' – what would you like parliament/ politicians to do?
