People of all ages are welcome to join us in the Senate Courtyard for [Open Air PlayUP](#). It's free for everyone from 15-19 April, between 9.30am and 4.30pm each day. Back these school holidays year with a party game twist, take part in musical chairs, challenge your family to a game of Giant Connect 4 or a round of badminton. There are plenty of spaces for quiet time too. Curl up with a book on a comfy cushion, build with blocks or just relax in nature.

If the autumn weather is a little temperate, MoAD's popular [PlayUP](#) exhibition, a fun and engaging space where children and adults can take part in craft activities, read stories and explore interesting spaces, is open from 9am to 4.30pm every day.

Want to make the world a better place? Young visitors can take some inspiration from artist Frida Kahlo, footballer Adam Goodes or musician Beyoncé. They can try on the iconic outfits of eight modern heroes in [DressUP](#) and discover how they overcame struggles to make a difference in the world.
